School Construction Update

We received good news last month from the state department of education. They have funded two more projects, putting a Loranger/Jameson project now third on the list! We are still going to have to go through a new application process this spring but we are extremely hopeful and cautiously optimistic that we will hear in 2025 that we will get a state funded school project. No schools currently on the list can leapfrog us in the next cycle. Only schools that did not apply last time in 2017-2018 could possibly move ahead of us if there is a greater need as determined by the DOE. Either way 2025 will be a big year as to how we approach new school construction in Old Orchard Beach. Unlike five years ago we no longer have the luxury of waiting. Jameson and LMS are approaching the end of their lives and we'll have to take swift action. If we do not receive state funding to replace them, area voters will have to decide most likely at the November elections in 2025 whether to build a school by raising local funds. DA Found

RSU 23 Students have a great opportunity coming up Friday, February 9, 2024, with the University of New England College of Dental Medicine Oral Health Center Clinic in Portland. They will be opening their doors for us and providing free oral health screenings, oral hygiene education, dental cleanings, fluoride varnish application, and dental sealant placement. The care provided this day is free and is part of the **Give Kids A Smile**® program. Give Kids A Smile® is the American Dental Association Foundation's annual volunteer initiative providing free educational, preventive and restorative services to underserved children.

Thousands of dentists across the country will give their time to help children access oral health care. These events kick off annually on the first Friday in February. UNE Oral Health Center Clinic is Volunteering **Friday**, **February 9**, **2024** for this event.

How it works: Students participating in this program will go during school hours, and transportation will be arranged. Pre-K Students have been learning about wind and water. This is the perfect time of year for hands-on exploration of the water cycle, as we get both rain and snow! Stay warm!

Kindergarten students began flexible groupings for literacy this month. This is a new practice in kindergarten that 1st and 2nd grade have successfully implemented, already. Students are really enjoying the smaller class sizes and the opportunity to work with different teachers and peers during literacy.



Prior to winter vacation, our Pre-K students welcomed Miss Maine, Young American Women of Service, to read to each classroom.

Students in kindergarten are also wrapping up their Animals & Habitats unit by learning about wolves. To celebrate all of their learning from this unit Spark's Ark will be coming to visit on January 26th!

2nd Graders have started Flex Grouping for Math in addition to our Flex grouping for Literacy Skills. Students are working with peers on skills they need to be successful learners--they've been going great!

Miss Kalina's class welcomed Ms. Angers to our classroom full time this month! She has been working with us all year, visiting twice a week before our winter break. Ms. Angers is in her final year at UNE and we are so excited to have her at Jameson!



Loranger Updates



Third grade students visited Mr. Drew and His Animals Too Exotic Animal Rescue in Lewiston in January. Mr. Drew himself taught students about some of the frogs in his care as well as the 9 species native to Maine. Unfortunately, we learned that 43% of frog species are currently facing extinction! This visit supported our literacy curriculum focusing on frogs.

In addition to frogs, Mr. Drew and his staff care for over 200 exotic animals including tortoises, tarantulas, snakes, geckos, iguanas and a rabbit named Alice. Students had the opportunity to hold, feed and touch many of the critters. Many memories were made on this trip!

We have exciting learning adventures happening in Grade 6! In language arts, we finished our class novel, Flying Solo by Ralph Fletcher and wrote letters to the author. We are anxiously awaiting his return letter, but we sent him a tweet and he responded! Students were super excited and said they felt famous!

In science, students have been working hard on finishing up a project over natural disasters. Through independent research, students have learned about ten different natural disasters and have designed a dodecahedron to display in our classroom! In math, students often have an opportunity to work on puzzles and challenges when done with their work or during our WIN time. One of our current challenges is the pentominoes heart puzzle. Using one set of 12 pentominoes, students have to completely fill the heart shape.



Environmental Science and Sustainability course has been doing monthly beach profiling of Ferry Beach to help the state monitor the changes in sediment to the area.

Eighth graders are having fun exploring budgeting for the real world with a "Game of Life" simulation. Students have chosen a career and "rolled the dice" to see how many children they have. 
OOBHS now has a winter climbing club! Students have been heading to Salt Pump Climbing Gym in Scarborough on Friday afternoons to climb
