Food and Nutrition Services have had a very fun and eventful winter! Our most exciting venture

has been using our new Flex Farms!

These hydroponic growing stations were purchased



using funds from a statefunded grant and have been growing lettuce for all students to try.

We have partnered with

many classes across all three schools to help plant and harvest the produce. Students are loving the opportunity to watch their food grow and participate in planting as well as learning about testing the nutrient and pH levels of the water in the growing station.

The Jameson school staff and district administration are busy planning for the 2024-2025 school year. A projection of our enrollment for next year will allow us to plan more effectively to know what our needs are. You can help by informing us of any child who will be entering Pre-K or kindergarten in the fall of 2024. This registration is only needed for students not already attending Jameson School.

To enter a new pre-K child, they must be four years of age by October 15, 2024, and to enter kindergarten a child must be five years of age by October 15, 2024. Loranger Updates

Loranger Memorial School in the News!

Loranger environmental science projects are spotlighted in the annual reports from two Maine organizations and their partners.

- Part of the <u>Census on Community-based</u>
 <u>Outdoor and Environmental Learning in Maine</u>, released February 29 at the State House, the Loranger pollinator project is a case study for exemplary climate science education. The Census is a state overview; the <u>Save Our Pollinators</u> project is on pages 9-12 in the case studies.
- The Gulf of Maine Research Institute's 2023 annual report, released in March, includes Loranger in several parts of the 2022-23 Education Impact Report: Empowering our Next Generation of Climate Scientists.

LabVenture: Loranger fifth graders (<u>see map</u>) have participated in LabVenture at GMRI for many years, building a foundation for further investigations of local ecosystems and climate science.

Community Science: Investigating Local Ecosystems: This section focuses on our Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA) project, now in its sixth year. Loranger students also study invasive crabs in grade 7, vernal pools in grade 3 and GATES, and phragmites and coastal flooding in GATES.

Findings from the Field: GATES students have written articles for Findings since its inception. They also peer review articles from other schools. Laura Seaver, featured in the spotlight box, successfully uses Findings articles in her fifth grade classes.



Seventh grade held our annual Outsiders book mock court trial this year at the Old Orchard Beach Police Station. Students took on the roles of lawyers, character witnesses, jurors and bailiffs. Each role required students to prepare by researching, exploring character roles, identifying text evidence and creating persuasive arguments. Special thanks to Chief Elise Chard for allowing us to use the station's community room for our event. Parent guest jurors commented that it looked like a real court room. Attached are some photos of the trials.

Loranger Community Science

Seventh grade GATES scientists have started a new project. Each month we'll go to the OOB pier and Ocean Park on one of the highest tide days to take photos and collect data for the Gulf of Maine Research Institute's Coastal Flooding Project. "The goal of this project is to help coastal communities gather data to understand their unique flooding impacts and begin to identify priorities for building resilience." (GMRI Coastal Flooding Project)



High School Updates

An overview of *Industrial Arts* at OOBHS shows a diverse program with offerings for students in several areas. Students learning the basics of residential building principles as they start the construction of a new crossing guard shack to replace the old one on the corner at LMS. The new shack will have many upgrades including: power, lights, heat, and a concrete pad.





The High School program is also revitalizing a welding booth to be added to a segment in its Industrial Design classes.

Along with welding the students are also completing segments in basic residential wiring and residential plumbing.

New to the 23/24 school year is a Drone Technology course offering. With the focus on assembly and repair, coding and programming, and the many uses of drones in industry today, students are engaging in complex problem solving activities to enhance their learning in this rapidly growing field.



English Department

In English I, we have just started reading the novel **Every Day** by David Levithan. While reading this novel, we dive deep into the idea of putting ourselves in other people's shoes. We push ourselves to learn how to be empathetic and respectful towards others, even if we have a different opinion or belief. Recently in class, we worked on a reflection activity with deep and personal questions. Students first completed this activity independently and reflected on their own beliefs. Students then interviewed a teacher or friend they felt comfortable with to get their perspective. Following that, they got to partner up with a friend or someone they felt comfortable with sharing what they collected and wrote down, and ended the activity in groups with students sharing their perspectives and appropriately responding to others' opinions and ideas. This pushed students to not only develop their own ideas and thoughts, but also learn how to listen to others and respectfully respond to them (whether they are agreeing or disagreeing).





At the end of February, WGME put out a notice that there were three Maine WWII veterans celebrating milestone birthdays: 101, 103, and 105! They asked that anyone interested send them a card with well wishes. The sophomore English classes just read Night by Elie Weisel, which is based in WWII; so, we thought it would be nice to send them a card wishing them a happy birthday and thanking them for their service. This was a nice opportunity to have students make real life connections to a text they have been learning about in our schools, while honoring these gentlemen here in our home state.


