Dental Clinic

We have a great opportunity coming up on Friday, February 7, 2025, with the University of New England College of Dental Medicine Oral Health Center Clinic in Portland. They will be opening their doors for us and providing free oral health screenings, oral hygiene education. dental cleanings, fluoride varnish application, and dental sealant placement. The care provided this day is free and is part of the Give Kids A Smile[®] Program. Give Kids A Smile[®] is the American Dental Association Foundation's annual volunteer initiative providing free educational, preventive and restorative services to underserved children. Thousands of dentists across the country will give their time to help children access oral health care. These events kick off annually on the first Friday in February. Students participating in this program will go during school hours, and transportation will be arranged. Consents and health history forms will need to be obtained prior to attending and will be sent to you after signing up for the program.

Kindergarten

Kindergarten students have been learning about animals and their habitats, including frogs, fish, owls, and wolves. Recently, we had the opportunity to dissect owl pellets. In our read-alouds, students learned that when owls hunt their prey, they swallow them whole or use their beaks to peck pieces of the animal before swallowing. They also learned that the bones and fur from the animal cannot be digested, so the owl will regurgitate a pellet that collects them. As students dissected owl pellets, they were able to sort the bones from their pellet to see if the bones came from a rodent, shrew, mole, or bird.







Loranger Updates Some Crabby Visitors

On Friday, December 13, Ms. Boyer's class was filled with a rather strange sight. Thanks to our intern from UNE, who is also a Marine Biology major, she was able to bring crabs to provide a real life example of an invasive species. This was perfect as the class was learning about ecosystems and biomes. The students learned that green crabs were brought to the coast of Maine by ships, and are destroying the local ecosystem and hurting local marine life.



Augusta Trip

The fifth grade took a trip to the Augusta State House led by Old Orchard Beach Representative, Lori Gramlich. Students debated a bill in the House Chambers about preventing the spread of invasive pests which is a topic we've learned about in science class! They did a fantastic job!

We had the opportunity to tour the building, take part in a scavenger hunt in the Hall of Flags, meet our Governor, and even role-play how a bill becomes a law. The fifth grade team hopes the experience inspired some future change-makers!



Hour of Code

Last week, all sixth grade students participated in the HOUR OF CODE! The Hour of Code takes place all across the world, and its goal is to get students interested in computer science by engaging them with hour-long coding programs. Loranger Community Science News

Students in Science Enrichment planted 20 Atlantic White Cedar seedlings as part of a coastal resiliency study with Charles Newport University in Virginia. In January, half the seedlings will receive a salt solution treatment to find out how they respond to increased salinity.



Students in grade 6-8 continue to profile West Grand Beach every month, measuring sand level changes in a line from the dunes to the surf. A late November storm left an unusual feature for our beach, a small cliff called a scarp. After measuring it, students enjoyed leaping off it. Students from LMS have been profiling this beach for 12 years, sending their data to the Wells National Estuarine Research Reserve and Maine Geological Survey.

Ms. Tomecka's Spanish class visited JES where each of the Spanish students picked a Spanish children's book. The students prepared a brief vocabulary lesson then shared the story with a small group of 6-yearolds. It was a wonderful experience!








MLL Math Day
